Get the grades. While grades aren't everything, employers do prefer candidates with a 3.0 GPA or above. Your GPA can also be an important determinant in graduate school acceptance. Get involved. Aside from grades employers want to see candidates who have been involved on campus and in their fields. Join a group or club. Give back. Recent research found that 80% of employers value volunteer experience on a resume. Get experience. When choosing between a candidate who has a 4.0 GPA but no experience, and a candidate with a 3.0 GPA who has solid experience, the employer will likely choose the candidate with experience. This is because more than anything, employers desire candidates with experience—the more the better. Experience comes in the form of full- and part-time work, practicum, student teaching, and volunteering. As you gain experience, be sure to keep track of it so you can put it on your resume.

Get skilled. In addition to the tips mentioned above, you should work to develop/improve those skills that are most desired by employers. Other factors include hard work, dependability/reliability, loyalty, positive attitude, self-motivation, and confidence.
